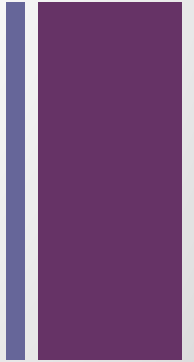

+ Things to Consider Before Choosing the Work Program

- Personality--Do you enjoy the social part of school?
- Sports--Do you play a sport which will not allow you to maintain a job during season?
- Academics--Would you need to sacrifice an academic to make room for the work program?

Reminder: The Work Program is a year-long commitment.

+ Scheduling for the Work Program

- One of your 5 lines is reserved for the Cooperative Education class
- You may choose *up to* 3 blocks for the work experience (either 2 or 3 blocks of work)
- You must pick up an application for the work program and return it to Mr. Morgan.

Note: It is up to you to select the desired amount of work blocks--you will not be allowed to drop courses next year to allow more work hours

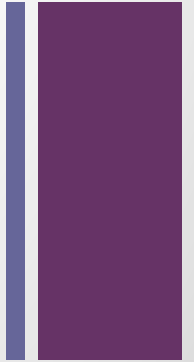

+ Alternate Courses

- Alternate Courses are used when your first choice is unable to schedule
 - Not enough interest in a course--results in the course being cancelled
 - Too much interest in a course--results in some students being removed from the class
 - Scheduling conflict--course meets at the same time as another requested course
- Alternate Courses should be listed in preferential order
- If you do not complete all 4 lines of Alternate Courses, your counselor will choose courses for you if conflicts arise.

+ New Courses

- Virtual Enterprise: Full year course that can be taken in grade 11 and/or 12. In school entrepreneurship program and global business simulation. The Resource Management course will be embedded in this course. This course fulfills this graduation requirement. VEI students, as a class, will establish and manage a virtual company that will conduct business with other VEI companies both domestically and internationally.



+ Old Course with Minor Changes

- College Algebra: A course that follows successful completion of Algebra 2. Students must have a C or better in Algebra 2 to be considered for College Algebra.
- College Algebra LCCC Math 131: A course designed for students who completed Algebra 2 with an A and who have a GPA of 2.75 or better. These students will receive 4 hours of college credit for this course. Students can also qualify for this course through an ACT/SAT score which will be determined by LCCC.

+ Old Courses with Minor Changes

- Business Tech Skills 1: Now called Computer Applications. This course still receives an OTECH credit through LCCC.
- Publication Projects: Now called Graphic Productions/Yearbook. This course can be taken multiple times over grades 10-12.
- AP Statistics: Now receives 4 hours of dual credit through LCCC. LCCC Math 145

+ LCCC Dual Credit

- Students enrolling in any transfer level dual credit class, (see page 5 of the Course Description Guide for a list of these courses), must meet the qualifying course prerequisite (grade/ACT/SAT score as agreed upon by Lewis & Clark and Civic Memorial High School) by the close of the current school year.



Schedule Changes

- The deadline for making changes to your course selection is on or before **April 1, 2017**. No changes will be made after this time unless initiated by a teacher/administrator.
- Students will not be allowed to drop a year-long elective at semester without a parent conference with an administrator.
- If April 1 falls on a weekend, the form is due prior to April 1.

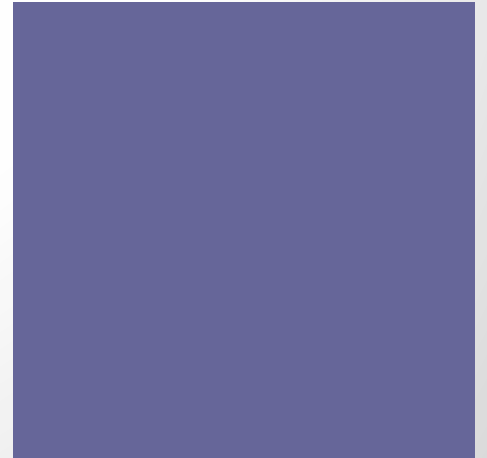
